Why does voting matter?

- "It is a fundamental right in American society the foundation of our democracy. By expressing our views through voting, we can help ensure that our government develops and implements good policies and protects our civil rights."
- ▶ "It is a way to say what's important to you."
- ► "It gives you a feeling of being part of America and your community. It can even be fun."
- "It's our civic duty in a democracy."

LOOKING AT NATIONAL NUMBERS

If people with disabilities voted at the same rate as people without disabilities who have the same demographic characteristics there would be about **2 million more** voters (Rutgers)

The 2000 presidential election (Bush v. Gore) was decided with a margin of only **537 votes** out of almost **6 million cast (0.009%)**

(In Delaware numbers, that would be the equivalent of just 70 voters out of 783,000!!)

How many Delawareans are voting?


2020 Presidential Election

Total Registered Voters 739,570

Turnout Primary 125,101 27%

Turnout General 509,241 68%

201,285 adults in DE have a disability (that is equal to 26%, or 1 in 4 adults)

WHO CAN VOTE?

- U.S. citizen
- Resident of Delaware
- 18 years old on or before Election Day
- Registered with the Dept of Elections

HOW / WHERE TO REGISTER?

In person at your county election office

Online at ivote.de.gov

On the Dept of Elections website







Call and ask that a form be mailed to you

DE driver's license or ID card needed to use ivote.de.gov

ABSENTEE VOTING OPTIONS

- ► Electronically at https://ivote.de.gov
- ► Download <u>fillable form</u> from DOE website
- ► In person at your county DOE office, before 12:00 noon on the day **before** Election Day

ABSENTEE CONDITIONS

- Outside the U.S. borders
- Outside of one's voting district
- Conflict with a religious practice
- Being "sick or physically disabled"
- Being a caregiver to a family member "...who is living at home and requires constant care due to illness, disability, or injury..."
- Possibility of "Permanent Absentee"

Right to Accessible Voting

U.S. law says that voting systems must be:

"Accessible for individuals with disabilities... in a manner that provides

THE SAME OPPORTUNITY FOR ACCESS

AND PARTICIPATION (including privacy and

independence) as for other voters."

ACCESSIBLE POLLING LOCATION

Polling Places must be accessible in terms of:

- Parking (spaces and location)
- Signage
- Path to entrance (level, smooth)
- Doors (width, handles, thresholds)
- Ramps (length, rails, slope)
- Space to maneuver wheelchair, scooter

ACCESSIBLE VOTING EQUIPMENT

Delaware uses the Express XL voting machine

- ► Height adjustable for sitting or standing
- Large screen (30 inches)
 - ► Voters can enlarge font size, change contrast
 - ▶ Voting card slot has tactile clues and Braille
- ► Universal Voting Console (UVC):
 - Large colored and shaped navigation buttons with Braille
 - ► Headphone jack
 - ►Sip-and-Puff wheelchair jack





WHAT LAWS PROTECT VOTING RIGHTS?

Federal laws protect everyone's right to vote, including:

- Voting Rights Act of 1965 (VRA)
- Voting Accessibility for the Elderly and Handicapped Act of 1984 (VAEHA)
- Americans with Disabilities Act 1990 (ADA)
- National Voter Registration Act of 1993 (NVRA)
- Help America Vote Act of 2002 (HAVA)

Important Note

You have the right to vote even if you have a guardian




Unless a guardianship order **specifically** states that a person is not capable of basic voting judgment, that person can vote.

Only one person can take away your right to vote:

A JUDGE



Who CANNOT take away this right?



DON'T LEAVE WITHOUT VOTING!!

Even if someone says you cannot vote, federal law states that in federal elections, poll workers MUST allow you to cast a Provisional Ballot. An election official will determine whether you are eligible to vote in the election, and if you are, your vote will be counted.

DON'T LEAVE WITHOUT VOTING

If the Polling Place or Vote Center Is About to Close:

Don't leave! If you're waiting in line when polls close, you have the right to stay in line as long as it takes to be able to cast your ballot.

If You Need Accommodations:

Poll workers are required to make reasonable accommodations to allow you to vote, in accordance with ADA standards. Ask to use the accessible machine.

If you were unable to resolve your problem, you have can file a complaint

If you or someone else was discriminated against based on a disability while registering to vote or voting, you can file a complaint with the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice, online or on paper. Assistance is available for voters who wish to use this option.

Identification to Register

- ► To register online, voters must have valid driver's license or ID card issued by the state of Delaware
- ► To register on paper, voters will need:

A valid photo ID

AND

► Another document or mail that shows their name and address, such as:

Utility Bill Bank Statement

Paycheck Government check

Lease Government letter

Some other government or official document (not hand-written) that shows their name and address.

Identification at the Polling Place

- You will be asked to check in and show identification
 - State-issued identification or
 - Mail that shows name and address, like a utility bill
- Identification is **not** required by law but having it will make things go more smoothly.
 - If you don't have identification, you can sign an affidavit.
 - If you encounter difficulties at the polling place regarding identification, ask to speak to the inspector, and if that doesn't work, to the county elections office
 - If that doesn't work, call one of the hotline numbers

Summary of Voting Rights for People with Disabilities

- You have the right to vote, unless a judge specifically says otherwise
- You have the right to assistance by a person of your choice
- You have the right to an accessible polling place and voting process
- You have the right to vote absentee or in person
- ➤ You have the right to be treated with dignity and respect in all aspects of the voting process

- Feb 2 Deadline to change party affiliation for Presidential Primary
- Mar 9 Deadline to register for Presidential Primary Election
- Mar 20 Early Voting (last day Mar 30)
- Apr 2 Presidential Primary Election (7am 8pm)
- May 24 Deadline to change party affiliation for Primary Election

Important Dates 2024 State Primary and General Elections

- Aug 17 Deadline to register for state Primary Election
- Aug 28 Early voting (last day Sept 8)
- Sept 10 State Primary Election (7am 8pm)
- Oct 12 Deadline to register for the General Election
- Oct 25 Early Voting (last day Nov 3)
- Nov 5 General Election (7am 8 pm)


